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Saturday, August 1 - Rhízome Sale

The Annual CHIS Iris Rhizome Sale will be held from 9:00 a.m. – 12 noon at Faddegon's Nursery on Saturday morning, August 1st. Please let all your friends know about it. And please reproduce the attached poster and send it around to friends or put it up on bulletin boards in your area, supermarkets, coffee shops, libraries, etc.

The sale offers members and the public the opportunity to buy iris rhizomes at a fraction of their retail cost. There will be bearded irises of all sizes – including miniature dwarf bearded, standard dwarf, intermediate, miniature tall bearded, border bearded and tall bearded irises. This year there will be a special emphasis on tall bearded irises. All the iris rhizomes come from our member's gardens and are therefore hardy in this growing area. And of course, they're all beautiful!

The irises are arranged by type and will be in bags with a picture of the iris. Each iris rhizome you buy is labeled with the name and description stapled to it so that you'll know what you're planting and how tall it is expected to grow.

Members should get to Faddegon's by 7:30 a.m. to help organize the many bags of rhizomes that we will have prepared at the rhizome prep party on Saturday, July 25th (see below). And don't forget to bring the bags of rhizomes you are babysitting to the August 1st sale!

Faddegon's is located at 1140 Troy-Schenectady Road (Route 7) in Latham. If you take the Northway (I-87), get off at Exit 6. Faddegon's is 2.5 miles west on Route 7. Call Euthemia at 439-3758 with questions.

Saturday, July 25 - Rhizome Dig

At 9:00 on Saturday, July 25th we will all gather at Euthemia Matsoukas' home in Delmar for the iris rhizome "prep party." For those of you who are new to the Capital Hudson Iris Society, this is a great example of the cooperative group spirit and team effort for which CHIS is known. This is the day we bring our bearded irises to be prepared for the Rhizome Sale at Faddegon's Nursery in Latham the following Saturday morning (see article above). Come even if you don't have any irises to contribute, we always need extra hands to help and you'll learn a lot about dividing irises.

Each person who has irises they want to divide should let Euthemia know what the irises are by 7/17. She will prepare labels and photos for each of the iris bags. If you don't let her know in advance, she can't make labels and photos and the irises won't sell at the sale without them! People want to see what they're buying! ... continued on page 2

Hello All,

Saturday, July 25th is our Rhizome Party and the following Saturday, August 1st is the Annual Rhizome Sale at Faddegon's Nursery. This sale is a major fundraiser for our club and a great opportunity to add to your collection of bearded irises. This year we should have an abundance of beautiful tall bearded iris rhizomes with contributions coming from members near and far. Be sure to let your friends know about the sale and distribute the attached flyer to whomever you think will be interested.

Now is time to mark out what you will be digging for the Rhizome Party and send a list to Euthemia so that she can have all the labels ready for the dig. Any named bearded iris that you have enough to divide should be dug as close to the date as possible and put into separate, well-marked bags to bring to the dig. Contact Euthemia if you need assistance or have questions.

The Siberian Iris and Perennial Sale in May was a great success. We grossed over \$2300 but do have expenses to subtract from that. Thanks to all who contributed plants, potted Siberians at the dig, worked at the sale, and to Ann Vandervort and her committee who bought beautiful wholesale plants to round out the collection.

The Iris Show on Saturday, May 30 at the Bethlehem Public Library was also a great success, with Virginia Dorwaldt taking three of the top prizes including Best Specimen of Show. See the article on page 3 for details on the show. Thanks to Kathryn Mohr for all her hard work on the show.

And all our thanks to Marty Shafer and Jan Sacks for hosting our bus trip to their wonderful Joe Pye Weed's Garden on June 7. Those of us who had been there before were once again floored by the beauty of the place, and those who were new to it were open-mouthed with awe. It is truly a spectacular place to visit. After stopping at Kimball's Ice Cream for a little "snack" we went on to O'Brien's Nursery in East Granby, CT and bought beautiful plants. It was Hosta Weekend and many of us were able to supplement our hosta varieties, but there were so many other beautiful plants that people bought. That's a special nursery definitely worth a visit, and it's not far from I-90 Springfield exit.

Rhízome Díg, contínued.

Please remember, we only want named varieties of irises. Generally speaking, if you don't know what your iris is called, don't bring it. The only un-named irises that sell well are the pink ones (you can bring those!). If you have any questions about whether you should bring an iris, send Euthemia e-mail.

New this year: We are no longer able to sell Iris pseudacorus (the yellow ones that grow so well in swamps) because New York has declared it to be an invasive species. (Apparently, it was declared invasive in Massachusetts years ago.) So if you have any, don't bring them!

At the prep party, we will take each iris clump, match it to the prepared labels and photos, clip the roots to about 4 inches and trim the leaves to look neat. Each rhizome leaf will then have a label stapled to it with the name, classification, price and description. As the iris is prepared, it is put into the bag with the other irises of the same name. The bag has a photo (if available) and description attached to the front.

At the sale, as people file up and down the aisles they are able to look at each iris and decide whether to take one based on the picture and description. Needless to say, those irises with a photo on the bag do really well in the sale. Others usually have to be sold at reduced rates because people don't really know what they are getting. So you can see why it is so important to let Euthemia know which irises you plan to contribute.

Bring the following items to the prep party: a folding chair to sit on, a folding table (bridge size is good) if you have one, a scissors or dividing knife or garden sheers to trim the irises with, gloves if you want to keep your hands clean, staplers, a roll of Scotch tape, and anything else you can think of that will make our job easier. Be prepared to take bags home to keep indoors (not in a hot garage) for the next week to bring to the sale at Faddegon's at 7:30 a.m. on Saturday, August 1st.
