
"Safe" outdoor events such as socially distanced picnics with BYO food and beverage and garden visits should be possible once warmer weather arrives.

(American Iris Society Selections vs Region 2 Favorites)

Thank you to everyone who participated in the 2020 AIS Tall Bearded Iris Symposium. This year most of us were able to view tall bearded irises only in our own gardens. All the same, you took the time to share your views on the irises you did see. It is important for our regional members to vote so we can have a fair representation in the national results.

All the irises selected are award winners of one type or another. Ten are American Dykes Memorial Medal winners (DM), these being voted the best in their class while 'Clarence' and 'Ink Patterns' both won the Wister Medal (WM), and 'Immortality' received an Award of Merit (AM). In fact, for three years running 'Immortality' has been the number one choice for Region 2 members. It is a lovely ruffled white iris and if it happens to rebloom in your garden, well, even more reason for it to be one of your favourites.

New Iris Reticulatas from Alan McMurtrie

Report from Alan McMurtrie with additional notes by Kate Brewitt

Reticulatas are the harbingers of spring in our Ontario garden. When they start to poke their heads through the barely thawed soil in March, I can be found wandering the garden, eyes cast downward, as if looking for lost treasure. If the neighbors were watching, I am sure they would think I had lost my mind instead. Terry and I have many of Alan's reticulatas, the earliest bloomer being 'Eyecatcher' which multiplies profusely. Consequently, it is scattered throughout our garden. 'Spot On' and 'Sea Breeze' are two others that stop me in my tracks so I can take a closer second look.

In early 2021 Alan sent me an email with pictures and notes on some of his newer reticulatas taken during a trip to Holland in early 2020. Because these irises signal a departure of the snow and the beginning of spring, I asked Alan if I could share parts of the email with Region 2 readers. Fortunately for us, he agreed. Read on...

Alan's 2020 Trip to Europe

2020 was my 13th year visiting Holland to see my Reticulata Iris hybrids blooming in the field. Unfortunately, bloom was a bit behind, so I did not see the massive bloom I often see. Also, a hare (large rabbit) was eating a fair number of the flowers in the field where the bulbs were planted – we will be using that same field again this growing season (2020/21). The good news is the bulbs seem to have done well after the disastrous 2019 (2018/19 growing season) – 2019 bloom had been particularly good, but conditions after Easter were perfect to allow disease to spread like wildfire. We have never had problems quite like that. Certain changes were made to allow more of the rice-grain size bulblets to be harvested. I look forward to finding out how much of each variety the grower can plant this Fall.

Introduction Notes

'Leopard' (12-IO-1) (below left) bloomed well (its 4th year of bloom), though as often happens when a variety has been growing intensely in a spot for several years, there were issues with this year's increase. From pictures of the bulbs the grower sent me in October, it will bloom in Holland next year. I am glad to report this Fall we received a few pieces of tetraploid material from the lab in Holland, and more are to be delivered next Fall. So hopefully I should see the tetraploid version in bloom in Holland in 2023. It will be 12 years after that, that Leopard can be introduced – yes, building up stock takes MANY years; especially if it is a variety that is expected to be popular. As shown in the photo of 'Leopard' below right, the "orange" fades as the flowers age.







"09 in 2015" (left) continues to do well. It first bloomed in 2018 and had obviously been missed when about ½ of the 2009 seedling area was cleared to help make room for 2015 seed. In 2020 this same clone bloomed in the 2009 area; however its tag was blank (meaning, it would have been found when things were being moved, but at the time I was not able to identify which cross it had been from – so its parentage continues to be a mystery).



13-FI-3 (left) bloomed for the first time this year – a unique pattern. The light-yellow wash on the falls is interesting.

14-HM-1 (below left) is cute/unusual for having light blue standards; though in this first bloom they were not all constantly shaped. The goal would be to get a hybrid with proper standards, and a significantly different colour from the rest of the flower. Imagine if 'Leopard' had proper ("normal") standards that were, for example, bright lemon yellow. Speaking of bright yellow, 14-KV-1 (below right), which bloomed for the first-time last year, is quite showy, but a bit on the small size. Converting it to tetraploid might make it a more reasonable size, but for now that is not in the cards.

In Memory of Judy Tucholski-Zon

I met Judy when she became a member of the Western New York Iris Society (WNYIS). Judy had just retired from teaching Kindergarten. She admired the flower design I had made for the refreshment table: "I want to learn how to arrange flowers." she said. So, I invited her to join my club, the Town and Country Garden Club. That summer she attended beginner design workshops and she quickly grasped the basics. She then joined Ikebana International Chapter 50, a local group, where she took enough floral design lessons to become a certified instructor in Ichiyo.

While with the WNYIS she served twice as the president, (2006 to 2007 and 2011 to 2013) and because she was a talented horticulturist, she served as an American Iris Society Garden/Exhibition Judge. She compiled the WNYIS annual Iris Show schedule and served as Show Chair several times. (It should also be noted that in 2006 Judy was awarded the Irwin A. Conroe Distinguished Service Award by AIS Region 2. - ed) As a member

of the Western New York Hosta Society, she was listed in the open garden directory and soon welcomed many visitors to her distinctive garden featuring a collection of irises and hostas.

As a member of the Town and Country Garden Club, Judy served as treasurer and twice as President. Every summer she and I entered the flower design and horticulture divisions in the National Garden Club, Inc. - District 8 sponsored Erie County Fair Flower Show. Soon Judy served on the Flower Show Board, a position she held for 14 years. Many of us remember Judy and husband Bob Zon at the fair helping set up the show with Judy giving design advice to exhibitors. As her talents as a designer advanced, she became a National Garden Club Master Flower Show Judge.

Once Judy volunteered as a District 8 Committee Chair, she quickly became the District Treasurer, and not much later she was our District Director from 2009 to 2011. Of course, she also held a couple of committee chairmanships on the New York State Federated Garden Clubs Board, and she was a State and National Life Member.

When Babbidean Huber persuaded the National Garden Club Board to hold the 2012 National Convention in Buffalo New York, she asked Judy to be her Assistant Chairman because she had been a dependable decision maker as District 8 Treasurer. Together they executed the most financially successful national convention. Mary Brummer, District Judges Council Chairman, also remembers the National Flower Show at that convention as fantastic. Judy then dedicated herself to chairing flower shows: The Fair, Plantasia and the last District show sponsored by the Judges Council in June 2017. But mostly she taught design workshops to encourage new show exhibitors.

Judy will be remembered as someone who was reliable and supportive. She shared her time and talents generously, especially as a teacher of flower arranging.

The Irwin A. Conroe Distinguished Service Award

The Irwin A. Conroe Distinguished Service Award is given to recognize a person who has served Region 2 of the American Iris Society in an exceptional way. This year's award honors Neil Houghton.



Raymond (Sandy) Ives died on October 13, 2020. Sandy became a Garden/Exhibition Judge in 1999, a Master Judge in 2013, and a Retired Master Judge in 2019.

2021 JUDGES TRAINING COURSE TENTATIVELY SCHEDULED IN REGION 2

Due to ongoing COVID-19 restrictions, the American Iris Society national convention has been cancelled for 2021 and Region 2 meetings and activities are currently "virtual" in nature. It is hoped that a "socially distanced" judges training session might be possible near the end of the 2021 iris bloom season in Region 2.

An in-garden judges training course has been "tentatively" scheduled on Saturday, June 26 from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The course would be taught by AIS Master Judge Joanne Bassett in her home garden in East Aurora, New York. The topic would be "Evaluating Irises – Before, Now and After Bloom." Irises would be evaluated for a variety of characteristics including vigor, state of foliage, increases, bud count, and the garden worth of an individual cultivar. Additional information on the course will be provided via e-mail at a later date.

<u>PLEASE NOTE:</u> Judges training sessions must be approved in advance by the Region 2 Judges Training Chairperson. Please let Wendy Roller know of any additional judges training sessions being proposed within the region during the year 2021.
