Zentangle for your Garden

We're trying something completely different and fun for the Sunday, October 13th, meeting at the East Greenbush Community Library at 1:30 p.m.

Joanne Maier with assistance from Euthemia Matsoukas and Virginia Dorwaldt will coordinate teaching the art of decorating Zentangle-style on miniature pumpkins, flat rocks and stones for the garden, and ceramic tiles. Zentangle is a relaxing art form using thin permanent markers on a variety of surfaces. We'll supply the miniature pumpkins (some white, some orange), washed rocks, and ceramic tiles. It's not hard and best of all you don't need to be artistic to do it. (See the pictures below and on page 2 for examples of what can be done.)

If you have a fine permanent marker, please bring it. We'll supply many but more are always helpful. Rocks tend to wear them out quickly, so the more we can have, the better. Also, if you'd like to do a larger pumpkin, do feel free to bring your own (white or orange). Likewise if you have a favorite flat rock from your garden you'd like to decorate, bring it/them – the lighter and smoother the rock the better. Pick ones you'd like to put outside in your garden – they look wonderful.

Coffee and cake begin at 1:30, we'll have a short business meeting at 2 and get to the fun art work after that. Go online to the Library if you need driving instructions, and email Euthemia if you have any questions.


