Doldrums Party: Sunday, 2/16/20, 11:30 a.m.

It's time again for the annual Doldrums Party, held each February at the Albany County Cooperative Extension. The Doldrums is a cooperative venture between the Upstate New York Hosta Society (the hosts this year), the Hudson-Adirondack Daylily Society, and CHIS. This year the speaker is Matthew Benson of Stonegate Farm outside of Newburgh. His talk is entitled "The PhotoGraphic Garden".

See a beautiful garden, a glorious blossom, a splash of perennial color – take out the camera and click. You know that this perfect light, this fragile, miraculous beauty is fleeting. Best to capture it. But knowing how best to capture all that beauty eludes many of us. You put your camera to your eye and shoot away, only to delete the image later when your lowly pixels disappoint. All the aesthetic excitement you experienced in the garden has perished and you're left with a pile of forgettable megapixels. Sound familiar? For anyone who has ever walked through a garden, the rich sensory imprint of color, light, and form can almost overwhelm, while the photographs we take are often a weak facsimile of the remembered experience.

We hope this will change after you hear Matthew Benson's talk, The PhotoGraphic Garden, which is also the title of his book. He will teach how to explore the garden with your camera; how to apply the fundamentals of composition, light, and color to image making; and how to use digital technology to improve and enhance images you've taken. Most of all, you'll be motivated to see like a camera, work like a professional, and imagine and create like an artist. Special attention will be paid to using your cell phone or iPad camera in the garden.

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Clematis: Queen of the Flowering Vines

Cathy Gifford, a Master Gardener Volunteer, presented a program on clematis for the January meeting. Her talk focused on varieties that grow well in the Capital District. The clematis were divided into categories (as follows) and each category was accompanied by beautiful slides of those particular varieties.

- 1. Super early and super easy (no pruning necessary) Examples: Markham's Pink, Pamela Jackson
- 2. Summer bloomers, fast growers and very easy Examples: Betty Corning, Pagoda
- 3. Those that don't climb, very easy Examples: Blue Boy, Serious Black

4. The Kivistik collection, summer bloomers, super winter hardy

Examples: Little Duckling, Minister

- 5. Summer bloomers, large flowers, very easy Examples: Ernest Markham, Jackmanii
- 6. Summer flowers, cupped flowers, easy Examples: Duchess of Albany, Etoile Rose
- 7. Really tall and easy Examples: Summer Snow, Virginiana
- 8. Early bloomers, not recommended for beginners Examples: Candy Stripe, Silver Moon

Those are just a few of the beautiful clematis that were pictured in the presentation. Several references were cited in the handout that accompanied the presentation. Cathy highly recommended Hummingbird Farm in Maine as a source for cold-hardy clematis. http://hummingbirdfarm.net/
