An Introduction to Gardening with Native Plants

At our first meeting of the New Year on Sunday, January 28, 2018, join Emily DeBolt, owner of Fiddlehead Creek Native Plant Nursery, to learn about the benefits and beauty of gardening with native plants. Learn which plants are great for monarchs and other pollinators and which plants can grow in tough sites such as clay soils or dry shade. Emily will introduce some of the native plants available for gardening, the benefits of gardening with natives, and will share some of her favorite natives from her own gardens.

Emily DeBolt owns Fiddlehead Creek Native Plant Nursery, which specializes in native plants for sustainable landscapes. Fiddlehead Creek Nursery is located in Hartford, New York, near Fort Ann in Washington County. Emily has years of experience working with natives as alternatives to invasives, as well as natives for rain gardens, pollinator gardens, shoreline buffers, and more. Emily has her bachelor's degree from Cornell University and master's degree from SUNY-College of Environmental Science and Forestry in Syracuse. She is a New York State Certified Nursery Landscape Professional and was selected as the 2012 recipient of the New York Native Plant Conservationist of the Year by the New York Flora Association. Emily and her husband Chris started Fiddlehead Creek in 2009 because of her love for native plants and her desire to make them more available in everyday landscapes.
