Karin Ursula Edmondson "Working with Native Plants: Designing with Nature" Sunday, March 18th

On Sunday, March 18th, we will continue our series of talks on native gardening with our guest speaker, Karin Ursula Edmondson. Her talk is entitled "Working with Native Plants: Designing with Nature." In her slide show and discussion, Karin Ursula will define what native plants are and why, now more than ever, they are vital for gardens to gracefully navigate climate change and to sustain pollinator habitat. Just as important – native plants are exceptionally beautiful. Basic design principles will be explored, and she will showcase her favorite native plants along with project details. Numerous visual examples will be provided on how to incorporate native plants into existing gardens.

Karin Ursula Edmondson is a landscape designer who creates and manages garden environments for humans, birds, bees and butterflies. She enjoys sharing her knowledge of ecological gardens with others and is confident that a kind heart and a trowel are mightier than the sword.
