It's a time we get together with the members of the Upstate NY Hosta Society (UNYHS) and the Hudson Adirondack Daylily Society (HADS) to compare notes, eat a great potluck luncheon and hear an inspiring speaker. This year's host group is HADS. If you haven't been there before, do come, you'll have a good time and meet some interesting people.

Bill Waldrop is our speaker for this year's Doldrums party. He operates Kennesaw Mountain Daylilies in Georgia (see their website for more). Bill has been growing Daylilies for over 25 years. He will show us his introductions from 2017 and 2018, his new doubles, and some of the many introductions that have received honors from the American Hemerocallis Society (AHS). In addition to daylilies, Bill and his wife, Diana, have added many irises to their garden and have been adding hostas to their shade areas, as well. Bill will tell us how they avoid providing local deer their daylily and hosta meals. There will be lots of beautiful pictures.

Bill Waldrop practiced law in Georgia for 30 years, retiring in 2007 to grow daylilies full time. He currently has 71 daylily introductions. He has won multiple AHS awards including Honorable Mentions, the Award of Merit, the AHS President's Cup, an Achievement Medal and the Ophelia Taylor Award.
