

# Founding of the Capital-Hudson Iris Society (CHIS)

\* From CHIS meeting notes, Bob Keup 2011 comments, CHIS and ESIS newsletters

Did you know that six HADS members founded CHIS? HADS was the closest daylily club for Helen Schueler of Syracuse, who was active at the regional level of the American Iris Society (AIS). Members Bob and Ann Keup, Don and Pat Salhoff and Kathryn Mohr discovered a mutual interest in iris and Helen encouraged us to start a club.

Our organizational meeting was Nov. 20, 1993 in Scotia. Helen, acting as a representative for the Region 2, led the meeting. AIS members from the Capital Region and Hudson Valley were invited. Helen presented a slide show of irises. Kathryn was selected as chair of CHIS and Steve McCarthy of Port Jervis became chair for the lower Hudson Valley (eventually Hudson Valley Iris and Daylily Society) CHIS was formally recognized by the AIS Board of Directors Nov. 7-8, 1994.

Bob Keup suggested participation in the 1994 Capital District Flower and Garden Show. Our iris talk was well-attended, which was key to the club's early growth.

Our first fundraiser was a \$1-a-pot tailgate perennial sale in May 1994 at Bethlehem Library, which netted \$50.

We had a garden tour in June 1994, traveling to the Keups', Euthemia Matsoukas', Salhoffs' and Mirca Slater's gardens.

Our first rhizome sale was July 1995, at Parkside YMCA. We netted \$1141.25

Our first iris exhibit was June 1995, informally "judged" by David Nitka of Connecticut.

Our first officially recognized AIS iris show was 1996. Laura Salhoff won Best of Show with MTB Bumblebee Deelite. Laura was competing as a youth member. Bob Keup's entry was runner-up.

# HADS Leadership Message

### Greetings from the Garden...

After the wonderful warm fall we've had, it finally got cold and windy these past few days. I know it's inevitable, but I don't have to like it. And it's not even really cold yet, so I guess I'm just in denial. It's time to finish cleaning up the gardens and move to the indoor garden for the winter. Houseplants, orchids, leftovers from summer like the three huge porch ferns that there just is not room for but that I can't bear to throw away. One thing we can look forward to is starting seeds for the next growing season - we'll be getting those seed catalogs soon. I have already gotten a tree and shrub list from FEDCO in Maine, I'm sure others are soon to follow.



But on my kitchen counter are a number of seed pods and dark seeds from daylilies rescued from my garden, on little pieces of paper labeled with mostly just the pod parent. Before they get scattered on the floor and totally mixed together, I need to DO SOMETHING with them. I looked up some information on how to best grow them out, and found a few opinions on the internet.

Daylily seeds

They can be planted directly in the garden in good soil, in a sunny spot, and let nature take it's course and see what comes up in the spring. We all know that this works, from the occasional volunteer seedlings we find. But that doesn't help the desire to see little baby plants growing up close and personal during the cold season.

Others describe how to plant the seeds in pots or trays in a good potting mix, keep them damp and warm, and in a sunny window or under grow lights on a shelf. If the indoor method is preferred, more complete germination is attained by pre-chilling them in the 'fridge for at least 3 to 5 weeks. This is called stratification, mimicking the cold damp conditions they would have outdoors over the winter. It's not strictly necessary but can be helpful to have them germinate closer together in time rather than over weeks or even months.



So putting the seeds in damp paper towels in small plastic bags (labeled of course), and storing them in the crisper of your refrigerator should do the trick. And as soon as the Christmas dinner dishes are washed and put away, they can be taken out and planted shallowly in the trays you've prepared, and misted or watered lightly. A little bottom heat should also help speed germination, and a plastic dome or plastic wrap on top will keep the planting mix from drying out too quickly. As soon as they start to grow, the covering needs to come off to avoid molds or damping off. If you have the room, a big-box store shelf unit with a couple of shop lights and timers will work just fine to keep them growing until they can be hardened off in the spring. You can spend a lot on specialized grow light setups, but simple components will work just as well. I feel that there is more control over temperature and the number of hours of light they get on such a shelf rather than on a possibly colder windowsill in the dead of winter. And I there is less chance of the cats knocking the whole tray off the windowsill and dumping everything on the rug if they are safe on a shelf in the basement.



When they get large enough to handle, they can be potted up separately in small cells trays or pots, and grown on until the warmer weather arrives. Wait until the weather is reliably warm, after the last frost, to plant them out, and then it's just keeping them watered

and weeded like any other seedlings. Again, labels are important, they will all look the same at that stage - kind of like small grass.

The last component of this process is patience. The new babies probably will not bloom the first year, especially up here in the northeast. Possibly in the second year and most certainly in the third, you will get to see the unique and special faces unfold when midsummer rolls around. Then I understand the hard part is deciding which ones to keep and which ones go to the compost pile. But of course they all will be special to you, and all beautiful in their own way. The stuff of garden dreams on those long cold winter evenings...

# Plans and Preparation for our Faddegon's Sale on August 9th

We know that a few of our newest members don't know what our sale next summer at Faddegon's on Saturday August 9th (Hosta & Iris on the 9th - DayLily on the 16th) will be about so let me try to share with you in a few words what we do...

Each year for as long as I can remember, the Management at Faddegon's Garden Center in Latham graciously allows us to use one of their Greenhouses to conduct a Fund-Raising Sale of Hostas the second Saturday in August that are grown by and/or donated from our members. They benefit from the increase in customers that come for our sale and we usually realize over a thousand dollars in profits each year. We have taken a Hiatus the past two years but we are back again for next year!

We will need everyone to mark your calendars now and plan to help out for a few hours the day of the sale. We also need you to go out to your garden at this time as your Hostas are going to sleep and decide which of your favorite clumps can be dug and cut in half next Spring as the new pips are emerging so you can put the first half of the clump back in your garden and then you can divide the other half up to put in pots to grow on for our sale on August 9th. As we shared with you in the past, we are taking a pro-active stance to help prevent the spread of Insect and Disease problems at our Annual Fund-Raising Sale at Faddegon's Garden Center in August. Your Board discussed in detail this concern at previous planning meetings and has mandated that all plants being donated for next year must be grown in new unused pots and sterile growing media. We always need several hundred pots from our members to meet the demand for our sale as well as the Bareroot Hostas we are buying wholesale to pot up on Saturday May 3rd at Kathryn Mohr's so please plan to help us out for both of these.


