President's Pointers

What does a Judge Look For?

You have been entering bloom stalks in the ONIS show for years however the R.D. Little Queen of the Show trophy has been elusive. You have decided that this is THE year you will win! Here are some pointers to help you achieve your goal.

It starts in the garden.

Cultural Perfection, or how well the specimen is grown, is the most important part of judging. Does it meet the perfection for that particular variety? For this reason it is important to have as fresh a specimen as possible.

Look for a flower where...

- a. the colour is clear with no discolourations.
- b. the size is in proportion to the bloom stalk.
- the petals show no signs of fading, streaking, curling or transparency (crepiness). These are all signs a flower is past its prime.
- d. the standards and falls hold themselves firmly with no tears, folds or pleating.
- e. it is almost or fully open. Partially open flowers can be judged but will be penalized as the bloom cannot be thoroughly examined.

Look for a stalk where...

- a. the bloom sequence is typical of the variety. Most varieties open one blossom at a time. Multiple blooms are acceptable if this is typical of the variety.
- b. the branch balance and bud placement are typical of the variety being evaluated. Toed-in buds, i.e. buds growing inwards towards the stalk, will be penalized.
- c. the leaves are free from spots, holes or tears. Pleating in leaves is not normal so avoid these stalks, unless the leaf can be removed.

Specimens are judged as they appear at the moment of judging so careful transportation is important to maintaining the integrity of your 'winning' bloom stalk.

Before the Judging begins.

Grooming is the next most important part of showing your irises as bloom stalks are judged on the whole stalk not just the flower.

- a. Select a show container proportionate for your bloom stalk. The tubes and the bases, which are supplied by ONIS, come in different sizes. The Show Schedule stipulates that for tall beardeds the first branch of the stalk should be less than 25 cm or 10" from the top of the container. Position the bloom stalk so it is as straight as possible. Stalks falling forward, backward or sideways loose points. Place wedging material (supplied by ONIS) into the top of the container to keep the bloom stalk standing straight.
- Spent blooms should be removed. Try not to tear the spathe (the papery material at the base of the flower).

- Discoloured foliage can be removed entirely or neatly trimmed by following the natural contour of the leaf.
- d. Fingerprints should be removed from the bloom stalk using a moist cotton ball or paper towel.
- e. Bugs and/or cobwebs should be removed. They may look good in photographs but they are not welcome on the show bench. Dirt, dust and other residues should also be removed.

- f. Improper modifications such as taping of petals or leaves result in disqualification.
- g. Make sure your iris has been placed in the correct class as outlined by the show schedule. Is that SDB really a SDB or is it an IB that did not grow well? Check with the Show Chair if you are unsure.
- h. Make sure your iris is correctly named. Judges use the American Iris Society (AIS) Iris checklist to verify names of irises. If the name has not been registered with the AIS then it will be disqualified. Again, check with the Show Chair if you are unsure.

Once your exhibit is in place, stand back and admire your efforts. Then go to lunch and wait for the results.

Exhibition Certificates are awarded to the outstanding seedling, plus any seedling that obtains at least five (5) votes from certified AIS judges. All AIS judges are asked to contact the Show Chair in order to pick up seedling ballots.

Show Rules and Regulations

- 1. This accredited show is being held and judged under the rules and regulations of the American Iris Society (AIS). These rules and regulations may not be violated. Judges' decisions will be final.
- 2. All entries MUST be staged between 10:00 am and 11:30 am. Late and unnamed entries will be accepted for display purposes only.
- 3. Exhibition privileges are open to all, including judges. Judges may not judge their own entries however they may judge entries of immediate family members.
- 4. Only specifically authorized personnel will be allowed in the show area during judging.

5. This is a cultivar show. All entries must have been grown and entered in person by the exhibitor whose name appears on the entry tag with the correct cultivar name and placed in the appropriate section. Members of a family may exhibit from the same garden.

Cultivars are to be arranged alphabetically in each section.

Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per cultivar; otherwise the number of entries by an exhibitor is not restricted.

Containers are furnished by the Society except where noted.

The Show Committee will aid the exhibitors to correctly identify the appropriate section.

Seedlings must be entered under seedling name or number and in the name of the originator.

Novices are those individuals who have never participated in an AIS sanctioned iris show.

Youth (persons under 19 years of age) may enter the Youth Division or the Adult Division but not both.

For Tall Bearded specimens, the stem length shall not exceed 25 cm (10") from the top of the container to where the first branch originates on the stem. It may be less if the stem is not of sufficient length.

- 6. Judging will begin at approx. 11:30 am. The show is open to the public from 1:00 pm to 3:30 pm. Exhibitors may not remove entries prior to 3:30 pm. Unclaimed entries may be sold for the benefit of the Ontario Iris Society.
- 7. The Show Committee will exercise all possible care, but cannot be responsible for loss or damage to exhibits.
- 8. Sections or groups for bulbous irises and collections are eligible to receive award stickers and special section awards. Award stickers are included in the tally for Silver and Bronze Medal Certificates although these entries are not eligible for the 'Best Specimen of Show' award.
