#### What's New on the WIKI?

As Photo Manager for the AIS Iris Encyclopedia (WIKI) I have been uploading pictures of 2022 introductions from hybridizers such as Thomas Johnson, Paul Black, Keith Keppel and the like. If you would like to see what's in the offering, here are instructions to easily find them on the WIKI.

- 1. Go to the WIKI: WebHome < Main < Iris Wiki (irises.org)
- 2. Click on 'Search Iris Database'
- 3. In the Search box type '2022'. Under Search Options click on 'Text body' and 'All Public Webs'.
- 4. Click the Search button.

You will end up with lots of results however the names of the 2022 introductions will be prefaced by their Iris Group e.g. Mdb, Sdb, Mtb, Ib, Tb etc. Click on one...and prepare to be amazed! New introductions are being added regularly so check back for new additions.

Alternately, if you interested in only a particular size such as SDB, click on the Iris Group web located on the left-hand side of the page. In the Search box in the upper right-hand corner, type in '2022' and click enter. Only the 2022 introductions in that iris group will show up in the results.

It should be noted that the TB web is different. After clicking on 'Tall Bearded', scroll to the bottom of the page where it lists 5 alphabetical webs. Select one web and enter '2022' in the Search box in the upper right-hand corner. The 2022 introductions for that TB grouping will show up in the results. Repeat for the next TB web.

# Ontario Iris Society Celebrating 60 Years

Do you remember where you were on October 31, 1962? I don't remember exactly but given it was Halloween, and I was only five years old, I was probably out 'trick or treating' dressed as a clown, a princess, or one of my other 'go-to' Halloween costumes at that time.

In the village of Richmond Hill however, a group of twenty iris enthusiast were gathering at the Richmond Hill Library to form the Toronto Regional Iris Group. Associated with the Canadian Iris Society (CIS), this was to be their first regional iris group. Because the CIS was based out of the Royal Botanical Gardens in Hamilton, it was felt that more people would be able to participate in iris activities if the venues were more local. As a result they would get more benefit out of their membership and develop a keener interest in iris. The first president was Murray Smith who served for fifteen years. During that time the group held four meetings; a spring and fall meeting devoted to culture or slide programs of general interest, an iris show in June and an iris auction and sale in August

at the Civic Garden Centre in Don Mills. The group also promoted iris through a public display garden in Edwards Gardens.

Several bus tours were also organized whereby members and their guests would travel to iris gardens throughout the Greater Golden Horseshoe region of Ontario...all for the low cost of \$2.50! They were always well attended with participants numbering between 40 and 50 people.

Subsequent presidents carried out the goals put in place by the members at the inaugural meeting. Spring and fall meetings with speakers and slide presentations continued at the Richmond Hill Library and later at the Aurora Public Library when the president resided in Holland Landing. As the group became more Toronto-centric, the meetings moved

to the St John's Rehabilitation Hospital in North York until eventually the group decided to focus on having only a spring flower show and a summer auction/sale.

At the beginning, the flower show was held in June at the Civic Garden Centre. Members cut bloom stalks from their gardens which would be entered in the show. These would then be judged according to the judging standards set out by American Iris Society (AIS). Trophies were awarded to those specimens deemed best in their class while others were awarded ribbons. Once the judging was over, the show would be opened to visitors to the Centre as a way to promote an interest in growing irises.

One year it was decided to move the flower show to Hillcrest Mall in Richmond Hill. Space was unavailable at the Civic Garden Centre, so an alternate venue had to be found. In the end it turned out to be a successful move as shoppers eagerly stopped to admire the beautiful flowers. This became the 'new home' for the show.

Within seven years though, the show moved back to the Civic Garden Centre and, later to the Don Mills Shopping Centre when, once again, the group was hoping to promote irises in a more public setting.

The August Auction and Sale has always been held at the Civic Garden Centre. August is the best time to dig and divide irises, and members donate their excess rhizomes to the sale to help raise funds for the group. It was a great way to enhance one's iris collection without 'breaking the bank' as rhizomes sold for between \$1 and \$3, a price that still holds today.

Another part to this event was the rhizome auction. The Canadian Iris Society (CIS) bought rhizomes from various American and local hybridizers. They had these planted at the Lath House at the Royal Botanical Garden (RBG). Every August some of the members would meet at the RBG to dig rhizomes for the Toronto and Hamilton auctions. I had the pleasure of participating in this undertaking one year. It was a gruesome task that year because the RBG volunteers who cared for the rhizomes had applied the nematodes too late in the spring and we had to deal with a borer infestation. I can still see the look on the face of one of the members when he cut into a rhizome and borer guts sprayed in his face. YUCK!

As we entered the twenty-first century our group decided it was time to increase its presence in the iris world. In 2002 the Regional Vice President of AIS Region 16 (Canada), Sandy Ives, suggested that the group become an affiliate of the AIS becoming one of two AIS affiliates in Canada. Our new name became the Toronto Region Iris Society (ToRIS)

In 2006 the Board decided it would be a good fit to associate with the newly renovated Toronto Botanical Garden (TBG), formerly the Civic Garden Centre. Their new goal to become a hub for plant-centred learning, conservation and research included promoting horticultural groups.

It was also at this time the Toronto Region decided to publish its own newsletter to better advise local members of club news and local events. A contest was held with members submitting possible names for the publication and "The Iris Standard" was born.

In 2010, AIS Region 16 (Canada) was dissolved. Affiliates in Canada were realigned with existing AIS regions in the United States. The Toronto Region Iris Society became an affiliate of AIS Region 2 which encompassed New York State. At the same time the Society changed its name to the Ontario Iris Society (ONIS) to better reflect the dynamics of its members who lived in various towns and cities throughout the Province of Ontario.

That pretty much brings us up to date. The last two years have been interesting, to say the least. The COVID-19 pandemic changed the way societies gathered. Fortunately technology allowed us to reinvent our events for a self-isolating, socially distanced society. Our show became 'virtual', and our sale went on-line. The first virtual flower show was a nail biter. Would people want to send pictures of the irises in their gardens? In the end, they did, and the event was deemed a success. The on-line sale was also a success as iris lovers are always on the lookout for suppliers of reasonably priced rhizomes. And we can't forget our Facebook page which became more active as self-isolating gardeners eagerly shared experiences and pictures.

In October 2022 the Toronto Regional Iris Society/Ontario Iris Society will have been meeting

for 60 years. The players have changed; however the goal has remained the same; to share our passion for the genus iris. The last two years have taught us that we can include members at greater distances by having virtual flower shows and on-line sales. And hopefully, once we get back to a 'new normal', ONIS will reinstate its in-person events at the Toronto Botanical Garden.

One last important note. Our current president, Terry Laurin, has held this position since 2005, surpassing the 15-year record set by Murray Smith, the first Toronto Regional Iris Group president. Terry is also the nephew of Verna Laurin, one of the twenty charter members who attended the inaugural meeting that Halloween night in 1962.

### **AIS Board of Directors Award**

This distinctive award is neither a garden award nor an exhibition award. This award is given by the American Iris Society's Board of Directors to honour an iris which has not won a Dykes Medal, but which clearly shows in its progeny that it is among the greats of 'irisdom'.

Candidate cultivars for this award are presented to the AIS Board of Directors by the Awards Committee or by nomination from any AIS member. A nomination is sent to the awards chair with supporting documentation. A simple majority of the AIS Board of Directors is required to give this award. The Board of Directors Award, which is not an annual award, was established in 1972 and first awarded in 1975. Previous winners are. TB 'Snow Flurry' (Salbach, 1939) in 1974, TB 'Tobacco Road' (Klensorge, 1941) in 1975 Siberian 'White Swirl' (Cassebeer, 1957) in 1987. This year, Paul Black's SDB 'Chubby Cheeks' was added to this prestigious list of recipients.

The following was taken from Paul Black's Facebook post on November 12, 2021, after he got the news.

"It started out as our usual fall/winter cold and rainy day. A phone call from our American Iris Society President, Jody Nolan, changed all that. She told me that one of my earliest introductions, 'Chubby Cheeks' had been awarded the Board of Director's

Award. I was overwhelmed and way beyond excited. I'm still a bit in disbelief.

It puts 'Chubby Cheeks' in some pretty select company. There have only been three other irises to receive this award.

Thank you to past AIS President, Gary White, for researching and recommending "Chubby" for this award and the AIS Board for voting for it.

When I made the crosses that led to its creation, I intended to create something of note but could never have anticipated the impact it would have on my hybridizing or its extension to both the SDB and IB classes overall. The majority of my SDBs (standard dwarf bearded) eventually trace back to 'Chubby Cheeks' and likewise other introduced SDBs after 'Chubby Cheeks'. It is also a noted parent in IB (intermediate bearded) breeding.

The trait that made it so special was the wider and more ruffled falls which it passed on to future generations.

To say I'm way proud of this award is a vast understatement. Time to celebrate one of life's beautiful moments.
